

# How does Tolma compare to WEAll?

The Wellbeing Economy Alliance (WEAll) is an international network of organisations who endeavour to convert the present financially-oriented economy into one of which the primary goal is wellbeing. Rather than proposing a one-fits-all economy, it has launched a procedure to collectively arrive at a wellbeing economy. 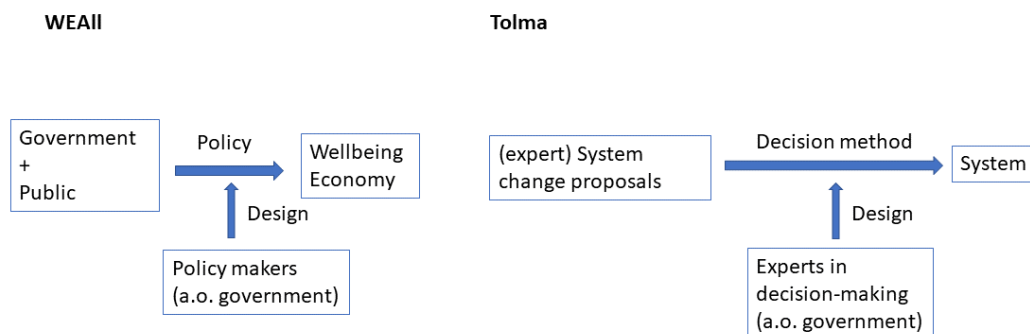

Tolma would 1. broaden the *scope* of WEAll and 2. hopefully speed up its *procedure*, as follows.

1. The *scope* of the wellbeing economy is already very broad. Tolma, however, is about system change, which would have to take into account even more: overpopulation, migration, armed conflict, and so on. The system change would also have to be global and not necessarily be focused on national economies.
2. As to the *procedure* of WEAll: that would be boosted in two ways.
  - a. First, WEAll is concerned with the *design of the wellbeing economy* by government and the public. This design would find a headstart in the repository of proposals for system change. Moreover, these proposals would contain a problem analysis, which is helpful to the problem analysis phase of the design process.
  - b. Second, there is the *wellbeing economy policy*, that is, the set of government regulations for creating the wellbeing economy. That policy needs to be designed and for that design, WEAll has a guide. This policy design, then, would profit from a collective decision-making procedure which has been agreed on by experts in social choice theory, group dynamics, decision fallacies, and so on. The broad scientific consensus may also make the decision-making procedure more acceptable to both government and the public.
